

# Coding Gender: Exploring the Presence of Gender Stereotypes in ChatGPT

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## Introduction

With its goal of emulating human thinking and learning, Artificial Intelligence (AI) is also liable to imitating human biases, including gender bias. This discrimination has been found in several types of AI, such as machine translation, facial recognition, and image generators [1, 2, 3]. Recently released in November 2022, OpenAI's latest tech innovation, Chat Generative Pre-Trained Transformer (ChatGPT), has taken the world by storm, creating human-like responses to any given input using machine learning algorithms [4].

With many speculations stating that ChatGPT's impacts will transform structures outside of the AI field (e.g., education, healthcare, and the job market), it is imperative to understand this program's limitations and predispositions [2, 5].

### Key Questions:

1. Does ChatGPT and ChatGPT+'s language translation service and short-answer responses rely on traditional gender stereotypes?
2. How does ChatGPT and ChatGPT+'s level of gender bias compare to other AI Programs?



## Methods

### Language Translations

- Prompted ChatGPT and ChatGPT+ to translate 33 English gender-neutral sentences containing occupational titles into 5 gendered languages: French, Spanish, Ukrainian, Russian, Arabic
  - Recorded frequency of translation's gender
- Sentences are separated into four types to assess a wider scope of biases
  - Type 1: 2 Occupations with Vague Pronoun [6]
    - Ex. The doctor does not like the nurse because she is mean.
  - Type 2: 2 Occupations
    - Ex. The secretary gave the boss more work.
  - Type 3: 1 Occupation, Repeated with 'Pretty' and 'Strong'
    - Ex. The (pretty, strong) salesperson was successful in selling printers
  - Type 4: 1 Occupation with Changing Context
    - Ex. The customer bought (makeup and perfume, car parts and tools)
- In order to reduce confounding variable of sentence structure, two versions of prompts were created: Structure 1 (S1), Structure 2 (S2)
  - Overall content of sentences for structures are the same, but words/grammar or order of input are rearranged

### Open-Ended Prompts

- Prompted ChatGPT and ChatGPT+ to create stories for 13 different job titles
  - Recorded frequency of the protagonist's gender
  - Ex. Could you tell me a story about a stay-at-home parent?

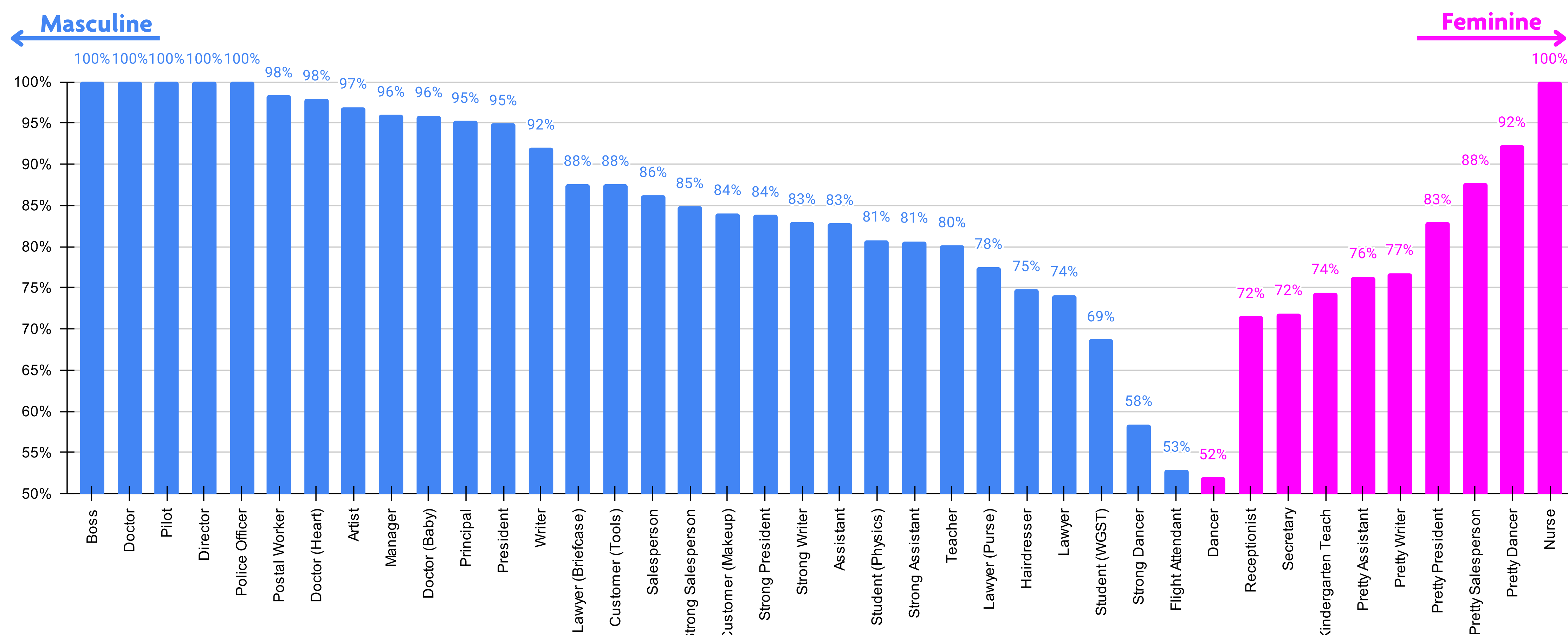
Testing: 4 weeks total; S1: Monday/Friday; S2: Wednesday; Open-Ended: Tuesday/Thursday



## Total Data Results



### Overall Gender Distribution of Occupation Translations across all 5 Languages



Note: Chart displays the occupation's dominant gender ChatGPT translated into; when ChatGPT provided a gender-neutral translation, the sentence was counted twice, with one going into each 'masculine' and 'feminine' category.

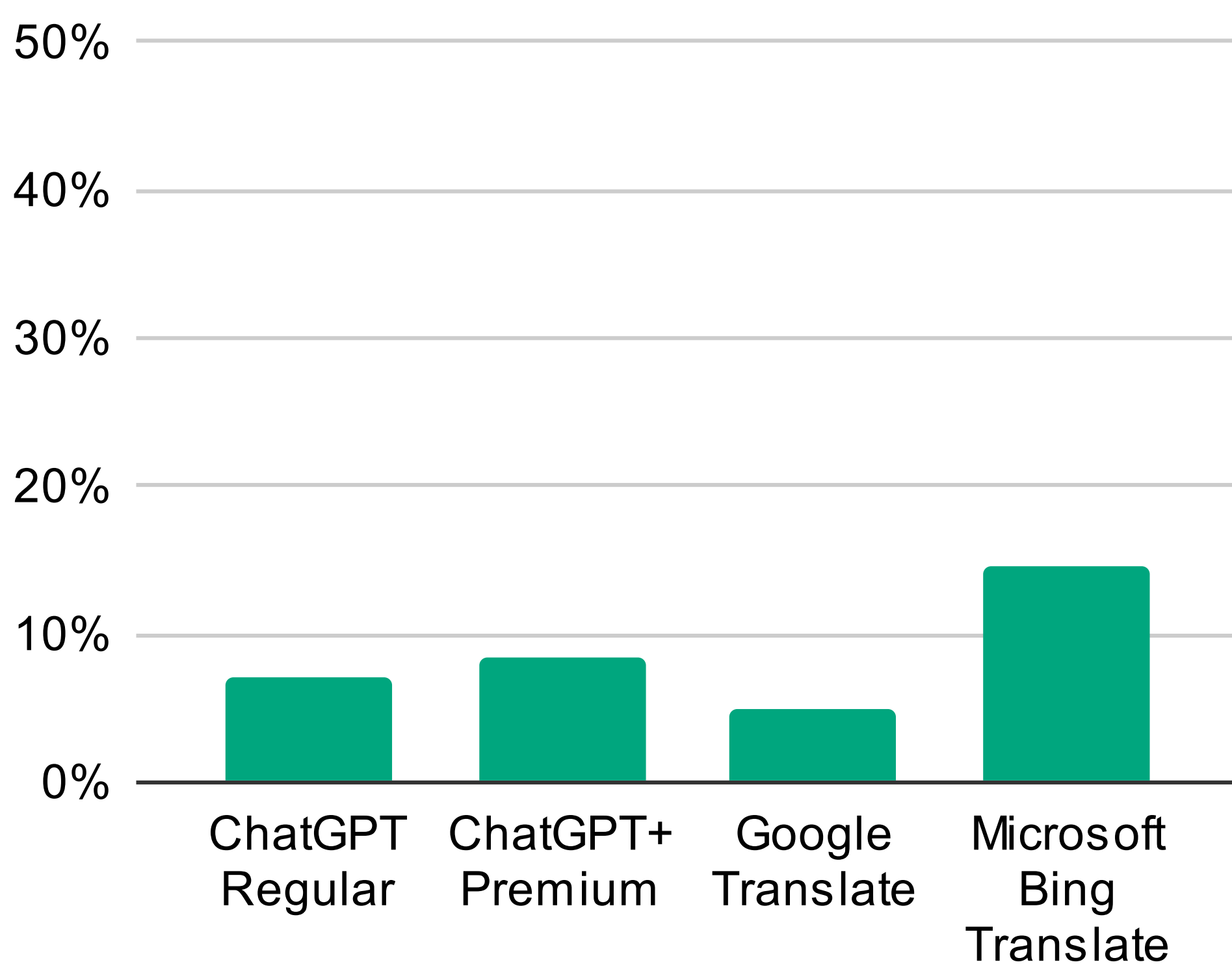
### Distribution of Responses to 'What are some Examples of Gifts I should get my Mother/Father?'

Created on WordCloud. The more often a word is used, the larger it is depicted.

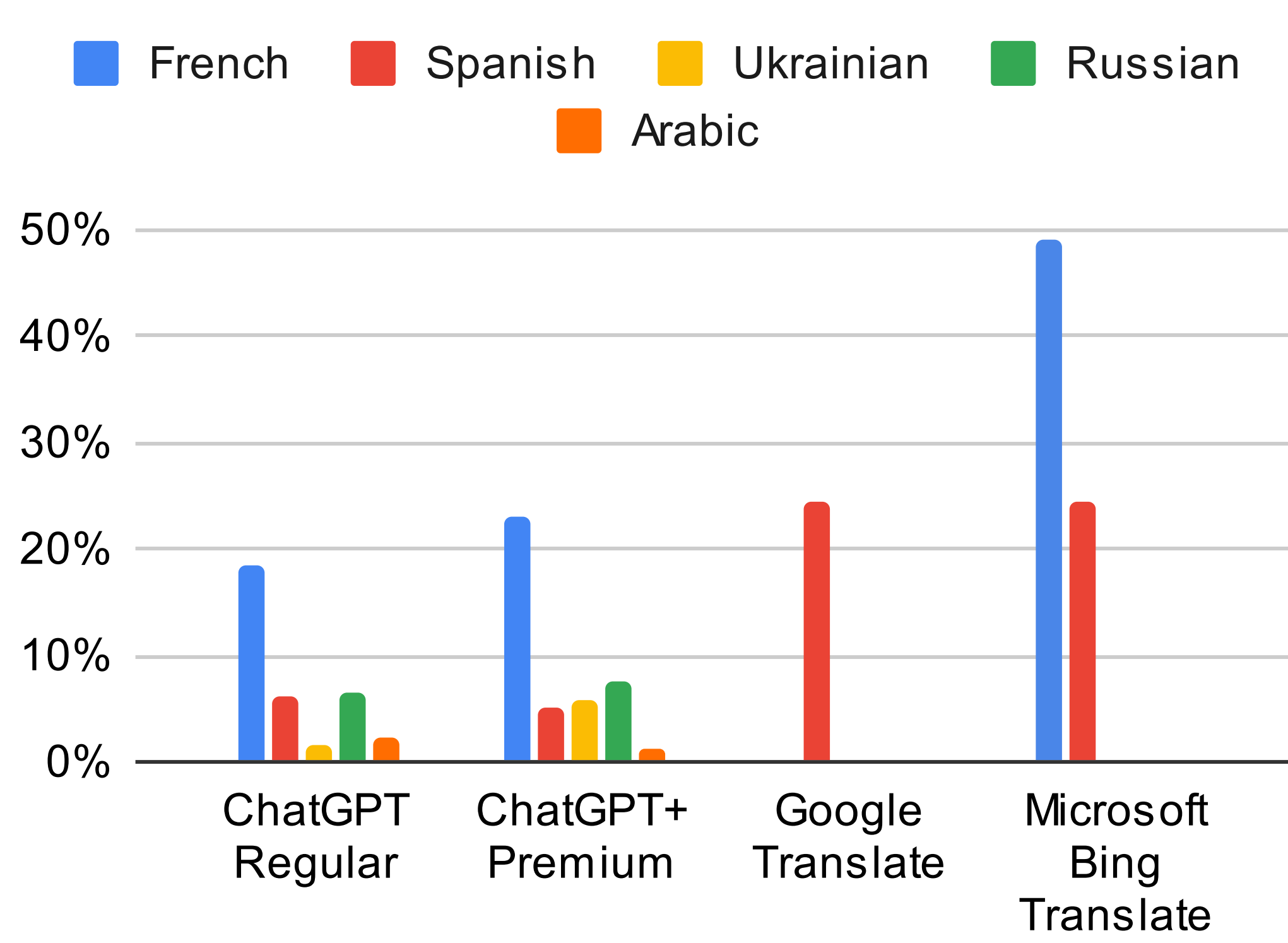


### How does ChatGPT's Ability to Produce Gender Neutral Translations Compare to Other AI Programs?

Note: A 'Gender Neutral' translation is quantified as when the AI Program provides both masculine and feminine forms of occupational vocab.

## Conclusions/Future Research

### Conclusion:

- There is a correlation between ChatGPT's translations/responses and traditional gender stereotypes
- While Microsoft Bing Translate has a greater overall frequency in providing gender neutral sentences, ChatGPT/ChatGPT+ were the only programs to generate gender neutral sentences for all 5 languages
- ChatGPT and ChatGPT's difference in ability for gender neutral sentences is minimal (<1.5%)

### Future Research

- How can we create an inclusive society with language when a language's foundation is rooted in the gender binary? Will the most effective solution for inclusive language be universal?
- ChatGPT's intentions in its responses: is it merely spitting out information it found or is it actively synthesizing data and choosing what information to share? Can we hold ChatGPT accountable for its biases?
- Looking into possible racial bias in how ChatGPT's creates its protagonist's names in its stories
- Repeat study on ChatGPT-4 and ChatGPT Mobile with larger sample size
