

WHITE ELEPHANTS OR ENGINES OF GROWTH?

An Empirical Diagnostic of Senegal's Agropole Sud

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Introduction

What is an Agro-Industrial Park (AIP) or Agropole?

A deliberately planned spatial hub combining hard infrastructure (utilities, transport) and soft infrastructure (skills, policy) to catalyze inter-firm collaboration, knowledge spillovers, innovation, and value addition.

Why this matters?

AIPs are promoted to connect smallholders to processing and regional value chains. However, physical infrastructure alone does not guarantee productive integration or sustained transformation.

Research Question

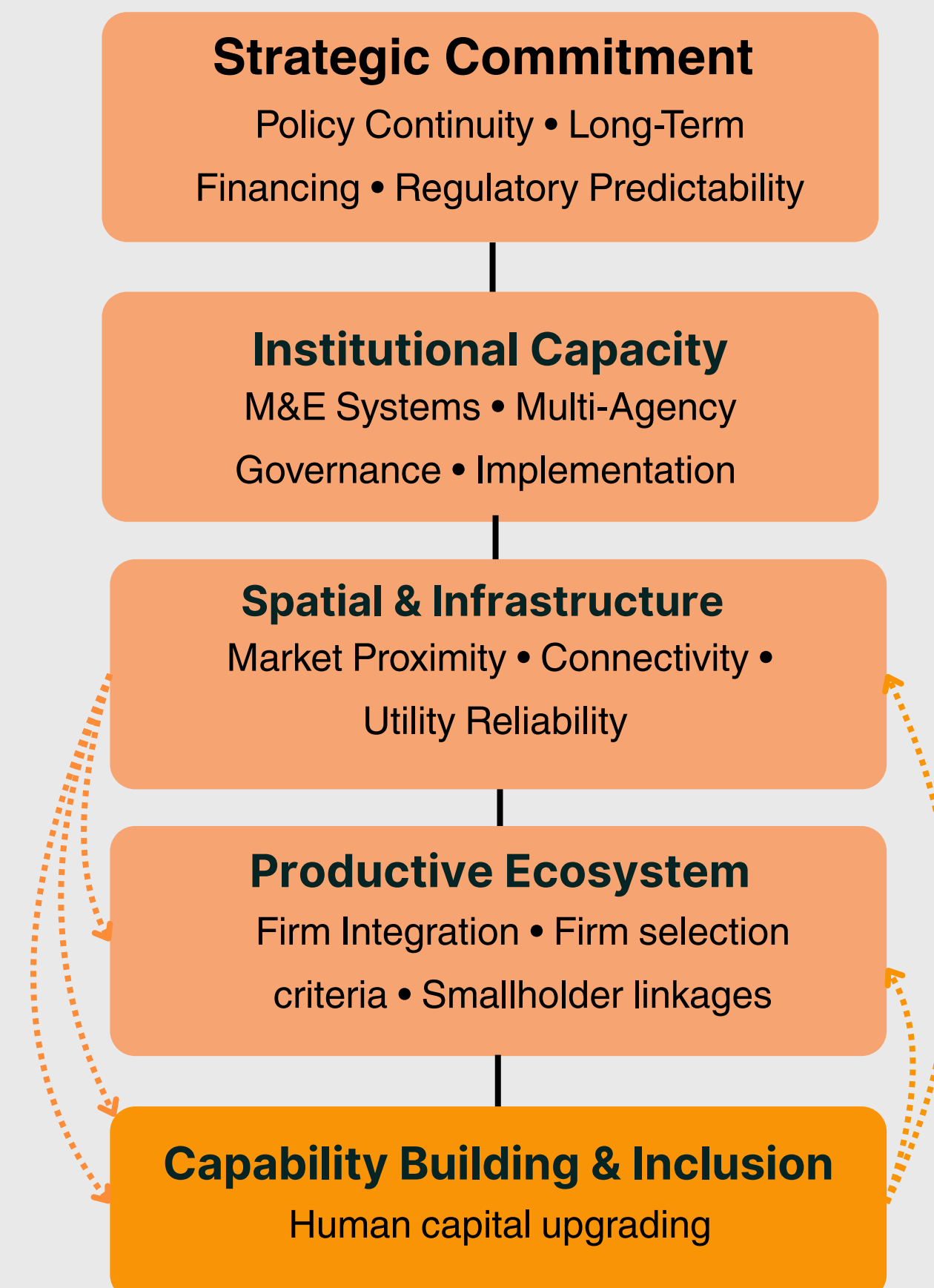
To what extent has Agropole Sud implemented the conditions identified in the literature as necessary for successful agro-industrial parks?

Methodology & Data



Ex-ante case study: evaluates project design and early implementation because full inauguration is expected around 2027.

5-Dimensional Diagnostic Framework



The framework evaluates whether physical investment is supported by the institutional and productive capabilities required to generate sustained local value.

What Does Evidence Show?

0% of farmers accessing planned training

35.7% of direct industrial employment

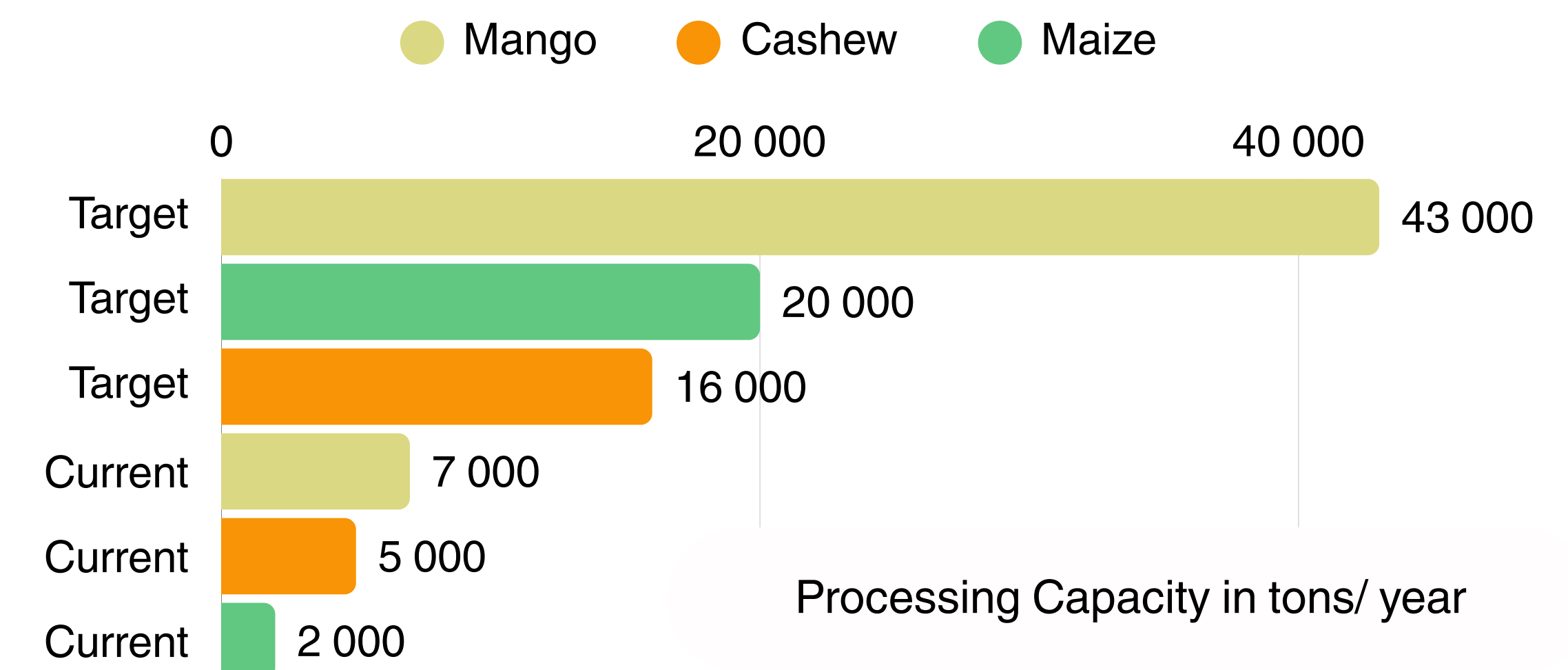

Diagnostics

Commitment ≠ Execution:

Formal commitment is strong; implementation credibility remains untested.

Infrastructure ≠ Industrial Capability

Physical investment must be matched by local absorptive capacity.

Proximity ≠ Productive Integration

Physical clustering does not guarantee local linkages between firms, SMEs, and smallholders.

Infrastructure ≠ Capability Building

Human-capability development shows the largest gap in available indicators.

Policy Implications

- Phase before scaling (Pilot)**
Prioritize operationalizing one of the processing hubs before rapidly expanding all planned infrastructures
- Make integration transparent**
Publish clear criteria for firm admission, SME participation, procurement, off-take arrangements, and smallholder access.
- Build capabilities alongside infrastructure**
Launch training, R&D, and university/vocational partnerships early enough.

Key Finding

Strong foundations. Uneven implementation.

Agropole Sud has established strong formal political and physical foundations, but implementation is uneven across the institutional, productive, and human-capability conditions required for agro-industrial transformation.

The central challenge is turning infrastructure into productive capacity.
